IMPORTANT INFORMATION: NON-HOMESTEAD MILLAGE PROPOSAL FOR WYOMING PUBLIC SCHOOLS

A Message from Our Superintendent

Dear Families and Community
of Wyoming Public Schools,

I am writing to share important information regarding the May 5, 2026 school election so our community has a clear understanding of the Non-Homestead Millage Proposal for Wyoming Public Schools. Voters may participate by absentee ballot beginning March 21 or in person on Election Day.

On May 5, voters residing within the Wyoming Public Schools district will consider a Non-Homestead Millage Proposal. This proposal represents the continuation of a long-standing funding source that supports the day-to-day operations of our schools.

The non-homestead millage is the primary local revenue source for school district operations. It applies only to non-homestead properties, including businesses, rental homes, vacation properties, and industrial properties. **It does not apply to primary**

residences, and homeowners whose property serves as their primary residence do not pay this millage.

If approved, the proposal would allow the district to continue collecting the millage previously authorized by voters. These funds are deposited into the district’s General Fund and support essential areas such as staffing, classroom instruction, student services, transportation, and overall school operations. This millage does not fund construction projects, major renovations, or debt repayment.

Under Michigan law, school districts must levy 18.0000 mills on non-homestead property to receive the full per-pupil foundation allowance from the State of Michigan. This proposal does not exceed that legal maximum. The ballot language also includes authorization for 4 additional mills, which may only be used if the approved millage is reduced due to statutory rollback provisions under the Headlee Amendment. Even in that case, the district cannot levy more than the legal limit.

In summary, this proposal:

- Maintains current funding and **is not a new tax**
- **Has no impact on primary residences**
- Directly supports students, classrooms, and daily operations
- Is required for the district to receive full state funding

Wyoming Early Childhood Center...An Underwater Adventure: Inclusive Coral Reef Family Night

On the evening of December 11, the Wyoming Early Childhood Center (WECC) transformed into a vibrant underwater wonderland for its building-wide Coral Reef Family Night. The event brought together over 200 participants from the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) and the Wyoming Public Schools Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) programs, celebrating two distinct programs united as one strong community.

The heart of the evening featured unique coral reef artifacts created by every classroom. These inclusive projects showcased the talents of all students, including those with and without disabilities. In a proud display of leadership, the students took the lead by facilitating guided tours of the reefs for their families, explaining their creations and sharing their learning.

The “ocean floor” was buzzing with high-energy activities designed for children of all ages and abilities:

Ocean Dance Party: A DJ kept the energy high with bubbles and crowd favorites like “Baby Shark.”

Interactive “I Spy”: Armed with magnifying glasses and special handouts, young explorers searched the building to find hidden treasures within the coral reefs.

Creative Cove: An art station allowed children to get hands-on with coloring pages and sticker sea creatures.

Ocean Style: Students enjoyed temporary tattoos to commemorate their underwater adventure.



To make the evening as welcoming as possible for busy families, dinner was served, providing a space for parents and neighbors to connect. Every area of the event was intentionally designed to be accessible, ensuring that every child, regardless of ability, could fully participate in the magic.

The Coral Reef Family Night was a spectacular success, highlighting the incredible growth of our youngest learners and the inclusive spirit that defines Wyoming Public Schools.

Our staff worked hard to create a fun and memorable night, complete with a DJ, snacks, and a photo area where scholars could capture the moment. The combination of music, laughter, and community spirit made the dance a huge success. Events like this help build a strong sense of community within our school.

Celebration of Learning

Gladiola's Celebration of Learning was a special evening dedicated to showcasing and celebrating the hard work and growth of our scholars. Families were welcomed into the building to experience student learning through engaging displays across all grade levels.

Classrooms were filled with a wide variety of academic presentations, including fossils, habitats, insects, the solar system, the American Revolution, inventions, and geology. The event created an opportunity for scholars to reflect on their learning while building confidence as they shared their knowledge with others.

In addition to classroom visits, families had the chance to participate in interactive experiences throughout the building. Our music, art, technology and physical education spaces offered hands-on activities, including putt-putt golf and opportunities to explore various instruments. Kindergarten students delighted visitors with impressive large-scale farm projects that highlighted their learning. 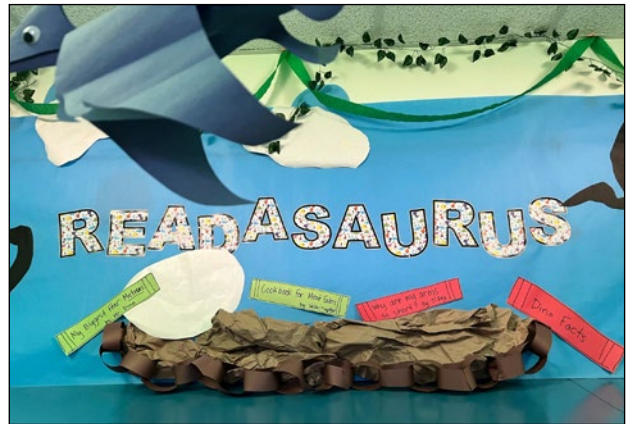

As a culminating activity, all students will visit the Grand Rapids Public Museum to explore its dinosaur exhibit and continue their learning beyond the classroom.



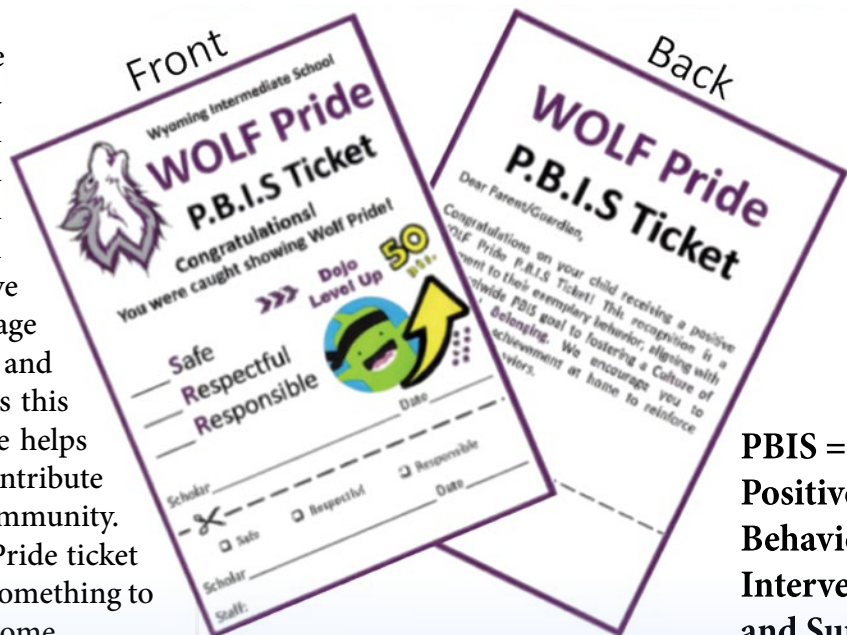

At Wyoming Intermediate School, as part of our ongoing efforts to build a strong culture of safety and belonging, we are proud to recognize scholars through our Wolf Pride PBIS “Level Up” Tickets. These tickets can be given out by any staff member to any scholar observed consistently demonstrating our schoolwide expectations of being safe, respectful, and responsible. This approach ensures that recognition is not limited to one classroom or one adult, but instead reflects a unified, schoolwide commitment to noticing and celebrating positive behavior wherever it occurs.

The use of Wolf Pride tickets is rooted in our PBIS framework, which emphasizes teaching, reinforcing, and sustaining positive behaviors through consistent and intentional practices. By acknowledging students in the moment, we reinforce the positive choices we want to nourish while helping scholars understand that their actions matter and are valued by the entire school community. This system also supports relationship-building, as it creates more opportunities for positive interactions between students and staff, contributing to a learning environment where scholars feel seen, supported, and connected.

When your child receives a Wolf Pride ticket, the top portion is sent home as a celebration of their success. In addition to this recognition, scholars also earn an additional 50 Dojo points, which can be redeemed in the Wolf Den school store, further reinforcing positive choices and motivation. We encourage families to take a moment to recognize and celebrate this achievement at home, as this partnership between school and home helps reinforce the positive behaviors that contribute to a supportive and thriving school community. 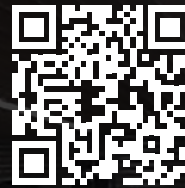
