

VACCINES REQUIRED FOR SCHOOL ENTRY & ATTENDANCE IN MICHIGAN

henever children are in group settings, there is a chance for disease to spread. Parents must follow state vaccine laws in order for their children to attend school. These laws are the minimum standard for preventing disease outbreaks in group settings. The best way to protect children from serious diseases is to follow the recommended vaccination schedule at www.CDC.gov/Vaccines.

In the state of Michigan, students entering 7th grade must have an up-to-date immunization record on file with the school, which includes specific requirements in addition to those needed for kindergarten. The key 7th grade-specific requirements are:

Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis) vaccine: One dose is required at age 11 or older upon entry into 7th grade or higher.

MenACWY (Meningococcal Conjugate) vaccine: One dose is required at age 11 or older upon entry into 7th grade or higher.

Michigan allows for two types of immunization waivers for children attending public or private school and licensed childcare settings: medical waivers and nonmedical waivers (for religious or philosophical objections). Please contact the Kent County Health Department to obtain an immunization waiver.

COLD-WEATHER CONSIDERATIONS

Members of the Kent Intermediate Superintendent's Association use a sustained windchill of -20 as one consideration for making the decision to close schools. Other considerations are travel conditions due to snow and ice and the time of day for which the sustained temperatures of -20 windchill are forecast and actually occur. Obviously, if temperatures are dropping overnight and winds are picking up so that temperatures are expected to drop to -20

after school start times, most districts will choose to open as usual on that day if travel conditions will allow.

Announcements will be made on local television stations regarding school cancellations prior to the start of the school day. There will also be a Robo Call made to all families and a notice on the district website under School Closings. Please make sure the school has your current phone number.

I haven't thrown up or had any diarrhea for 24 hours.




Keep me at home if...

I've had the sniffles for more than a week, and they aren't getting better.

I still have asthma symptoms after using my asthma medicine (and call 911 if I'm having trouble breathing after using an inhaler).







Snow or ice totals can vary greatly over short distances

A heavy snow band may form, dropping more snow in one location while significantly less snow falls just a few miles away.







Winter forecasts can change frequently

Forecasts may change as new model data becomes available. Always check weather.gov for the latest information.



Focus more on the winter storm's impacts

Don't focus too much on exact numbers, and consider the full range of possibilities.







Know your winter weather terminology

If a Watch is issued, get prepared for hazardous weather. If a Warning or Advisory is issued, take action – hazardous weather is occurring or will occur soon.



Rely on a dependable source for weather info

Choose your information sources wisely, and follow a name or organization you know and trust.

WPS Inclement Weather Policy

Inclement Weather Scenario:

School is cancelled and students are sent home for the day.

Policy:

All practices/games/ extra-curricular activities are automatically cancelled for the day.

Inclement Weather Scenario:

School is cancelled prior to the start of the school day due to inclement weather. (Snow Day)

Policy:

All practices/games/ extra-curricular activities are automatically cancelled for the day.

Inclement Weather Scenario:

Tornado Watch/Warning

Policy:

All practices and games are cancelled for the day.

Practices/Games may resume after watch/warning has ended with permission from the Athletic Director or Principal.

Inclement Weather Scenario:

Thunder/Thunderstorm
Watch/Warning

Policy:

All outdoor practices/games are immediately suspended until 30 minutes after the last thunder/lightning strike.

Wyoming Early Childhood Center... Empowering Every Voice: AAC

At Wyoming Early Childhood Center, communication is at the heart of everything we do. Our center proudly serves young learners through six Great Start Readiness Preschool (GSRP) classrooms and four sections of Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) classrooms. Within these classrooms, our scholars display a wide range of communication skills—from those who are developing typical receptive and expressive language skills to those who are nonverbal.

To ensure every child has a voice and a sense of belonging, we integrate visual supports and Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) tools throughout the entire building. These supports range from light technology, such as pictures and symbols, to high technology, including full communication boards and speech-generating apps on iPads.

While AAC is essential for some scholars, it benefits everyone. Visual and AAC supports help children communicate more clearly, build confidence, and engage more fully in classroom routines and social interactions. They empower scholars to express their wants and needs without relying on others to

interpret their intentions—reducing frustration and helping prevent unexpected behaviors.

The impact of AAC reaches far beyond academics. By giving all children the tools to communicate, we nurture friendships, relationships, and a stronger sense of belonging. Whether in classrooms, hallways, or on the playground, AAC is accessible and encouraged everywhere at Wyoming Early Childhood Center.

Dispelling the Myths

A common misconception about AAC is that it prevents or delays verbal speech. In reality, research shows that AAC supports and enhances verbal communication. For many children, using AAC helps them learn language, organize their thoughts, and practice expressing themselves—often leading to increased spoken communication over time.

At Wyoming Early Childhood Center, we believe that every child deserves a voice—and AAC helps make that possible. By fostering an inclusive environment where all communication methods are valued, we give our scholars the tools to connect, learn, and thrive.

Gladiola Elementary...

Donuts in the Den Brings Families Together at Gladiola

Gladiola Elementary recently hosted its **Donuts in the Den** event, welcoming more than 150 scholars and their special guests for a morning of donuts, coffee, and juice. The event created a warm, inviting atmosphere where families could enjoy time together and reconnect with the school community.

Getting families back into the building is a key priority for Gladiola this year, and Donuts in the Den was an awesome example of that. Staff volunteers worked together to plan and organize the event, securing donations of coffee and paper supplies from community partners. Their teamwork and commitment helped make the morning both meaningful and memorable for everyone who attended.

"It was just nice seeing kids and adults sitting down and enjoying time together," shared Ms. Fields. One scholar added, "I've been looking forward to this for weeks!" Wyoming Intermediate School...

Our recent PBIS 3 Mile Project Challenge was a powerful reflection of our ongoing commitment to building a Culture of Safety and Belonging at Wyoming Intermediate School. PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) is a research-based framework used nationally and internationally to help schools create predictable, positive, and supportive environments. Decades of educational research show that when students clearly understand expectations, receive consistent feedback, and see positive behaviors modeled and reinforced, they feel safer, act more responsibly, and are more engaged in learning.

It is important to note that PBIS is not a reward system and not about "prizes" or "fun events." Instead, PBIS is grounded in teaching and practicing schoolwide expectations in the same way we teach academic skills. The goal is to help students build internal motivation, self-management, and a sense of belonging. PBIS celebrations—like the 3 Mile Project Challenge—serve as acknowledgments, not rewards. They highlight students' positive contributions and reinforce the idea that their daily choices matter to the wellbeing of the entire school community.

This year, nearly 400 scholars earned the opportunity to participate in the 3 Mile Project Challenge—demonstrating their commitment to being Safe, Respectful, and Responsible across the school day. Their participation represents more than an event; it reflects consistent effort, positive decision-making, and our collective work to support students in meeting expectations.

The recent 3 Mile Challenge survey results reinforce this effort: almost 80% of participating scholars shared that the PBIS Challenge motivated them

to make better choices at school. This feedback affirms that PBIS is strengthening student engagement, encouraging positive behavior, and building a greater sense of connection and belonging across our building.

Looking ahead, scholars now have another opportunity to earn their way into our next PBIS acknowledgment event—the Wolf Pack Variety Show—taking place in December. We remain excited to continue offering meaningful, motivating experiences that celebrate students' growth and reinforce the positive culture we are building together at Wyoming Intermediate School.







Wyoming Junior High... Building Belonging Through Celebration and Connection

At Wyoming Junior High, fostering a strong sense of belonging is central to who we are. This fall, our students came together for the school's first ever PBIS PACK Celebration Dance and Festival of Games, an event that captured the heart of our district's *Culture of Safety and Belonging* strategic goal.

The celebration, featuring a live DJ, dancing, and a variety of interactive games, was more than just a fun event. It represented our ongoing effort to create authentic opportunities for students and staff to connect beyond the classroom. Partnering with the **Wyoming High School Student Council**, teachers and administrators joined students on the dance floor and at game stations, reinforcing relationships that strengthen our community.

By recognizing positive behavior and collaboration through PBIS initiatives, Wyoming Junior High continues to create an inclusive environment where every student feels seen, valued, and connected. This event not only celebrated our students' achievements but also deepened the culture of belonging that defines our school community.



Wyoming High School...

Every Student, Every Plan: Building a Future-Ready Path for All

At Wyoming High School, we are committed to ensuring that every student leaves high school with an **Educational Development Plan (EDP)** that reflects their goals, interests, and next steps after graduation. An EDP is more than a document—it's a living roadmap that helps students explore who they are, where they want to go, and how to get there.

We are taking an intentional approach by embedding career and college readiness activities into the day-to-day curriculum for every student, grades 9–12. These activities include hands-on learning and real-world experiences that build toward a clear postsecondary plan. Some of the experiences are below:

9th Grade: Students begin by exploring their personality styles and learning how their strengths and preferences connect to different career paths. They will also participate in a Reverse Job Shadow, meeting professionals from a variety of industries to learn about possible futures.

10th Grade: Sophomores take their exploration a step further by completing a career research project and visiting a college campus to experience what higher education looks like in action.

11th Grade: Juniors spend time discovering future pathways, learning more about possible careers and education options that align with their goals through guest speakers, Trades Day, college campus trips, and work-based learning opportunities.

12th Grade: Seniors focus on the transition beyond high school—completing FAFSA applications, college and scholarship applications, college campus trips, work-based learning opportunities, and finalizing their postsecondary plans.

To support students in building meaningful EDPs, we're excited to use the **SchooLinks** platform as a central hub for planning. Through SchooLinks, students can explore career interests, research colleges and training programs, track goals, and plan their next steps—all in one place.

We encourage parents and guardians to ask their students to share what they've been working on in SchooLinks and explore the different features together. Families or students who have questions about SchooLinks or their Educational Development Plan are encouraged to reach out to their school counselor for guidance and support.

By integrating these experiences throughout the high school journey, we are helping every student graduate with confidence—and a clear, personalized plan for the future.

or two mentors are on each of the district's 16 buses every afternoon.

The ninth- through 12th-grade mentors are recommended for the job by high school administrators and are considered leaders at the school. They fill out job applications as any Wyoming Public Schools employee would, and are trained on expectations and dos and don'ts. They are paid minimum wage, \$12.48 per hour, for two hours every school day.

"Safety of our students is paramount, so this whole program has been an incredible asset to this district, and I am so thankful that our administration sees the value in allowing this to take place," Steffes said.

Sadie said she is having a great time getting to know the students and works hard to make sure they follow the rules. They draw together and play games like "I spy. All the kids are really kind," Sadie said. "They listen really well, and I mainly wanted to be a mentor because I like helping little kids a lot and getting to know different people."

Kallemeyn, who has been driving a bus for 12 years, said Sadie and other mentors are much appreciated. "They're very helpful. The (younger) kids are just being kids. They are squirrelly. It helps to have an extra pair of eyes back there keeping them mindful of what they need to be doing," she said.

An Investment in Students

WPS started the program to address behavior issues on the bus, Steffes said. High School teacher Anna Servo mentioned the idea for a bus mentor program to him after

she heard about one in another district. Things took shape from there, and Servo invited students in a peer mentor program she advises to apply. She encouraged other teachers to recommend students as well. Servo said she sees the program as a great way to invest in and support Wyoming students. The young students emulate the older students and build relationships with them. "The kids don't want someone on the bus that is just an adult telling them what to do. They want someone cool and fun," Servo said.

Bus mentor Koby Lango, a sophomore, said he sees the role as a way to help out the drivers. "The bus driver has a really big job. They have to watch over the kids and watch the road at the same time. I just like being there to help out," he said.

Mentor Erionn Palmer, a sophomore, said the job gives him something to do after school, and he enjoys it. "They ask me a lot of questions. I really just answer questions the whole time. They have new ones every day," he said. "It encourages younger students to really listen and pay attention."

- 3. Students who miss more than 10% of school a year (just 2 days a month)
- 4. Being late to school or leaving early leads to poor overall attendance
- 5. Absences affect everyone when teachers have to help

Students who are absent, arrive late or leave early get less learning time than students with better attendance. That's why every student and every parent should Strive for Less Than 5 absences each school year.



MENTORS STEP UP ON SCHOOL BUS

High-schoolers model behavior, build relationships

It was the typical after-school hustle and bustle as Gladiola Elementary students boarded the school bus, full of energy and eager to move, talk and get home to their families. About halfway down the rows of seats stood Wyoming High School sophomore and bus mentor Sadie Parks, greeting the kindergarten through fourth-graders.

"How was your day?" Sadie asked, ushering the children on the way to their seats and listening to their cheerful, sometimes funny answers.



With bus driver Diane Kallemeyn at the wheel, the dropoff route went smoothly. Students chattered about school and Halloween, and Sadie made sure all remained calm and orderly. To students with the wiggles: "Sit up, face

forward," she reminded them.

A first-grader showed off her drawing; another asked Sadie to tie his shoe, his leg stretched out from his seat.

"Victoria, you are an artist!" she said, glancing at the drawing while continuing *Pari* to watch the students around her.

Sadie is one of 30 high-schoolers who accompany elementary and Wyoming Intermediate School students on the bus ride home every school day. The district has hired them as bus mentors to serve as role models for good behavior, and to make sure the younger students are following the rules.

They are an extra set of "eyes and ears," said Joe Steffes, WPS safety, security and transportation director. One
